The brain-based visual impairment known as Cerebral/Cortical Visual Impairment (CVI) is the leading cause of pediatric visual impairment in the developed world. Originating from a wide spectrum of cognitive impairments and neurological damage, CVI is seen as one of the most concerning public health issues of our time.

Anchor Center is a recognized leader at the forefront of research and early intervention strategies in the assessment, diagnosis, and treatment of CVI. As we continue this work, we are building innovative programs to meet the needs of this unique population, partnering with researchers around the world, and leading the way in developing protocol trainings for professionals and parents.

Most children with CVI will not regain normal vision. However, early identification, assessment, and critical interventions make significant improvements in functional vision possible.

There is no cure for CVI but there is HOPE.

Progress for pediatric visual impairment

Since 1982, Anchor Center has been serving children with pediatric visual impairment and their families. Today, Anchor's specialized staff including clinicians, educators, therapists, and researchers provide a wide variety of programs and services:

Our Work

Research & Development

- Pioneering research identifying and developing effective screening methods for premature infants at risk for CVI in partnership with local and national hospitals
- Establishing standard of neonatal care for early screening and detection of visual impairment
- Identifying and developing evidence-based early intervention practices
- Standardizing and digitizing functional vision assessment processes and building metrics to provide guidance for practitioners and track results
- Optimizing systems for data collection
- Addressing barriers and essential access to resources and education on complexities of CVI
- Validating and demonstrating reliability of both currently used and newly developed assessment and intervention tools alongside a network of collaborators and innovators in the field of pediatric visual impairment



Innovative Services

- Screening for CVI in newborn and infant population
- Pediatric Ophthalmological Examinations
- CVI-specific assessments and functional vision assessments
- Consultations with families, caregivers, practitioners, and providers to implement intervention strategies for ocular and brain-based visual impairments

Training & Education

- Learning opportunities for professionals who work with early childhood populations with ocular and brain-based visual impairment
- Producing and offering cutting-edge trainings for practitioners based on evidence-based strategies and interventions
- Building advocacy skills and holistically educating parents, caregivers, pediatric healthcare professionals and students, allied healthcare providers, early childhood special educators and TSVIs, and family resource professionals
